## Malcolm X shot dead at Harlem rally

### Two Negroes arrested after street chase

New York, February 21  
Malcolm X, the Negro nationalist leader, was assassinated while addressing a meeting in Harlem today. He fell after a barrage of shots. Later, two Negro men were arrested and charged with murder.

The Negro leader, who recently returned from a tour of Africa and a visit to Britain, was taken to a nearby hospital with three bullet wounds. A spokesman there said he was taken to the emergency room "either dead, or in a death-appearing state."

The spokesman added: "The sounds were centered in his chest and I believe one was in his neck." This conflicted with a police report that he was shot in the stomach. Three other men were wounded in the shooting.

It was at 3 p.m. that Malcolm X rose to address the audience in a ballroom, where he held weekly meetings of the Organization of Afro-American Unity, his new movement. He was armed after falling out with the Black Muslims, which he led in New York, because of the remark he made at the time of President Kennedy's assassination, "the chickens are coming home to roost."

As he rose, one of his followers climbed on the rostrum and told the audience: "Malcolm is a man who would save his life for you. There aren't many men who would lay down their lives for you." Malcolm X stepped to the rostrum and received a thunderous ovation.

# Martin Luther King Killed By Sniper In Memphis While Standing On Motel Balcony

Telescope-Sighted Rifle Found; 2 Persons Held

MEMPHIS—The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., Nobel Peace Prize civil rights leader, was shot fatally here Thursday night while leaning over a second-floor railing outside his motel room.

Four thousand National Guard troops were ordered into Memphis by Gov. Buford Ellington, spokesman, and when the King was returned, 15,000 troops had been ordered to Memphis. (Continued on Page 14.)
