WHAT IS IT ABOUT?

- This competition is an excellent opportunity for young girls (aged between 14-18) to discover the world of diplomacy.
- The British Embassy in Paris will cover the travel to France.
- All the candidates must answer the following question "How can we raise public awareness of the importance of including people with disabilities in all areas of society?".
- . The winners will be selected anonymously based on their video by a judging panel, which includes British Embassy employees and independent members. The number of winners shall be three.
- . The winners' prize consists of: Shadowing a British Ambassador in France (either in Paris or Strasbourg); Opportunity to visit the Residence of the British Ambassador in Paris or the Council of Europe in Strasbourg. First-hand experience of multilateral diplomacy in France
- .The rules of participation in the Ambassador for a Day campaign are as follows: The winners must have a written parental consent in order to travel to Paris or Strasbourg in March 2025. An overnight stay might be necessary depending on the city of origin.
- The winners must be available to travel to either Paris or Strasbourg on the week of March 8th to spend the day with an Ambassador. The winners must have a chaperone, who is over 21 years old (parent, teacher, guardian) in order to travel to Paris/Strasbourg in March 2025 and spend a day with an Ambassador.








This event was part of the 5th edition of the "Festival au Féminin." Thanks to the organizers, we had the amazing opportunity to watch the preview free of charge!


The journal encouraged us to analyze the story deeply and reflect on the book's themes and our own progression through the novel. It became a sanctuary for our thoughts and creativity.


