
PREMIERE B.F.I

During the holidays, students had to read two books in order to prepare for the future litterature lessons. We had Twelfth Night by Sharespeare and Emma from Jane Austen.



SECONDE STUDENTS' INTERVIEW

We interviewed two Seconde SIB students to hear about their first impressions of the programme. Meet Ethan and Fred!

Question 4: How did you find your very first tests in history and literature?





<u>Blake</u> with the two introductions.

• Creative Activity:

Dramatic reading = We perfomed the poem by adding gestures, tones, and echoes to the words.
